

Ancestor Anecdotes

A Family Heirloom Travels from Wales to England to Canada

I am lucky enough to be providing a home for the remaining pieces of a china tea set in "Original Bridal Rose" pattern, which has passed down through the eldest daughters of my mother's family for well over 100 years. The Maker's Marks on the underside of many of the pieces are only gold-coloured squiggles. Small, hand-written marks tend to indicate china made before 1800.




The tea set came to my mother, Blodwen, in England on the death of my Welsh grandmother, Elizabeth Roberts. I remember going to Bentalls Department Store, in Kingston upon Thames, with my mother to purchase a Welsh dresser and then helping her set out some of the pieces on the shelves. Other pieces were stored in the cupboard below. While we were doing this we talked of the tea set and its history. My mother remembered how her mother had received it upon the death of her own mother, Ann Lounds.

Almost forty years passed before the tea set and dresser were shipped to me in Canada on the death of my mother. It was then my turn to unpack the tea set and, with my daughter's help, arrange it on the shelves of the dresser.

With the arrival of my granddaughter, another link in the chain of tea-set ownership, I held a tea-drinking ceremony. Two-month old Emily smiled at her mother while Robyn and I drank from the tea cups and ate off the tea plates. A tape of the Froncysyllte Male Voice Choir played softly in the background as we turned the pages of my grandfather's Welsh prayer book. To conclude the ceremony Emily was encouraged to slobber over one of the cups.

Emily Ann Krause, born Calgary, my grand-daughter

These youngsters, who were orphans, street children or from impoverished homes, were sent off to Canada, South Africa and Australia to seek a better life. As Canada needed farm workers, many of the young people sent here were employed on farms. Various charitable groups were responsible for their passage and later welfare.

Nola spoke of her grandmother's experience as a Home Child and showed us some artifacts of interest plus photos along with her PowerPoint. All who attended learned a lot more details about this period in Canadian history. Thank you, Nola.

Novels With a Family History Twist

I know many of you are using this time to work on your family history research, which is great, but sometimes you just want to relax and enjoy a good book.

Did you know there are several series and many stand-alone novels that have a family history theme? Here are some of the books I have discovered. They are all available as digital books that you can download right now and read for free!

KINDLE UNLIMITED/KINDLE APP

Found through the Amazon website at www.amazon.ca, Kindle Unlimited is a subscription book lending service that you pay for monthly. If you have never tried it before, you can get a free, 30-day trial. After the 30 days, if you don't cancel you are charged \$9.99 per month (\$10.49 with tax).

This gives you access to over one million books and you are able to borrow as many as you want, while your subscription is active. The titles do change over time so make sure to check the ones I've listed are still part of the Kindle Unlimited collection when you join.

You can download the **Kindle** app for free from your usual app store on any digital device (iPads, iPhones, Android smartphones, etc.). This means you don't have to own a Kindle device to use the service.
