Alberta Ancestors Website - An Introduction Jim Benedict

Our Cemetery Projects team has been scouring Calgary and area cemeteries, collecting photographs, inscriptions and vital information. This fine work deserves a display case and that will be on our new website, Alberta Ancestors. You can check out what is already available at: https://albertaancestors.ca

HOME PAGE

The home page is simple and has just four search boxes: Surname, Given Name, Birth Year and Death Year. As you type in a surname, you will get a list of suggested matches (be patient, it might take a second to appear). If there are no matches then that surname is not on the website (yet). If there are matches, click on the suggestion that matches the best. The same goes for the other three search boxes. To clear your search, use the green X button to the right of the search box. After you do a search and press Enter, note that the counts for Persons, Photos and Cemeteries in the box below the search boxes will be updated. This shows how many matches your search has found on the website. Next, click on the Persons button to be taken to the list of matches on the Persons page.

PERSONS PAGE

You will find that the Persons page still has the four search boxes at the top. You can click on the green question mark underneath the search boxes to find help on navigating the search results. Options include adjusting the number of results listed and sorting using the Surname, Given name, Born or Died columns. It also notes that the person's age is calculated from the span of years between Born and Died so may not be exact. The final column, labelled Location, shows a small gravestone icon with R.I.P. written on it. Clicking on the icon takes you to the marker information on that individual. So for my grandfather, Peter George Benedict, I see his marker photograph on the left and some information on the right: his birth and death years, burial name, burial month/year, cemetery and burial location. This may also contain some memorial information.

The main page of the website includes three other tabs: Insight, Cemeteries and Stories. Currently, Insight is a work-in-progress and will eventually be used for descriptive information. Cemeteries shows all the cemeteries we have added to the website on a map and a Cemetery Directory by name. Stories takes you to a newspaper-style page with articles on notable and notorious citizens of southern Alberta.

The Login button currently doesn't offer anything extra, but there are plans to add member benefits in the future.

The Alberta Ancestors website surpasses the contents of Find a Grave and BillionGraves because, thanks to our project crew, we have access to interments for mausoleums, scattering fields and unmarked graves. The website also includes a growing list of southern Alberta cemeteries. We currently have 40 and are continuing to add more.

We are continuously adding new content, so check back to see new postings.

From the Southern Alps to Alberta's Rocky Mountains Marian Jones

My grandfather, Augusto Albramo Chemelli, was born in the shadow of the Southern Alps, in the village of Madruzzo, Austria, on Sept. 8, 1894. His birthplace is now known as Trento, Italy, because the area was given to Italy after World War I. Grandpa was the second son of Primo Giacinto Chemelli, a cobbler, and his wife, Maria Pedrini. He had an older brother, Antonio, and a younger sister, Adelaine.

When Grandpa's father died at age 38 in 1903, he left a widow and 3 children under the age of eleven. Maria was forced to work hard outside of the home for a few liras to support her family. Antonio went to work in the coal mines when he turned 12. Grandpa learned to be a cobbler as a young boy using his father's tools. Life was hard.

Several years later, Antonio took over the family business, which was his birth right as the eldest son. With no future in Madruzzo or Austria, Grandpa looked for other options. A cousin had come to Canada a few years earlier and reported that there was a future here in Southern Alberta. There were also rumors of a war coming and the threat of being conscripted into the German Army.

Grandpa immigrated along with his cousin Antonio "Tony" Pedrini on the *S.S. Carolina*, landing at Ellis Island, New York on July 25,1913. He arrived with six dollars and forty cents in his pocket and traveled by train to Diamond City, Alberta, where Tony Pedrini's brother Lugi lived. Their plan was to find work in the coal mines.

Grandpa worked in several Alberta coal mines including Diamond City, Coaldale and others in the Lethbridge area. He was involved in several mine explosions, including one that landed him in hospital in Lethbridge with severe burns to his face and left arm. He took this opportunity to learn English from his roommates. My Grandpa was a smart fellow and learned to speak and write English. He was already fluent in German and Italian.

Shortly after the accident, he met my grandmother, Ottilia Maria "Mary" Betsch, and they were married in Lethbridge in 1918. Mary came from Crimea but was ethnically a German from Russia. They had three children while living at Diamond City, Alberta. My mother was the eldest and she had two younger brothers.

They moved to a farm in Sundre, Alberta, in 1926, that Grandpa purchased only half a mile from Grandma's parents' farm. Here the little family worked hard clearing the land of trees and rocks.

Grandpa was not only a farmer. He had his own little blacksmith shop to make his ploughshares. And he obtained the necessary shoe lasts to keep his children's shoes in good repair, and those of his neighbors too. Grandpa worked hard to provide for his family and was known for helping his neighbors if they were in need.



From the hill above their little home, Grandpa could look west and see the Rocky Mountains. They reminded him of the Alps just north of his home village of Madruzzo.

Sadly, I never knew my Grandpa Chemelli as he died in 1945, several years before I was born. My mother and Grandmother shared their memories of him with me, and I was able to fill in some of the details using the passenger list and his naturalization papers.

Tech Tips

Inserting a Watermark on a Photograph Warren Peterson

In the last Tech Tip column, I described how to extend the canvas of an image to add a caption. Another useful photo task is inserting a watermark, especially for images shared on-line. The last thing you need is for some stranger to be claiming ownership of your image!

There are a few ways to do this that are supported by Irfanview. If you are only doing this for a few photos and want to use text for the watermark, the simplest way is to insert a caption directly on the image.

Open your image with Irfanview. With your mouse, draw a box where you would like your watermark to be. Then go to the Edit menu and choose "Insert text". Place your watermark text in the box. Make the background transparent. Change the text transparency to suit your preferences. In this photo of my parents, Alice (Thorne) and Walter Peterson, I set the transparency to None to make it easier to see. Use the Preview button to view the result, and adjust the text style, size and colour to suit. When you like your choices, click "Okay" to save the image with another name.



If you want to use an image as your watermark, the process is similar, but it requires having an image or logo in PNG format with a transparent background. Open your image and use your cursor to select where you would like the watermark to go. In the Edit menu choose "Add overlay/watermark image." A dialog box appears for selecting your image to superimpose. Then Preview and adjust the overlay transparency. It is also possible using Irfanview to apply a watermark to an entire batch of photos. Refer to the Irfanview help files for instructions.

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
