### **DNA** Discoveries

#### **DNA Knocked Down a Brick Wall**

Anyone that has looked at the Canadian census knows that under "place of birth" you find just the country name. That's what happened to Larry when he looked for his great-grandfather. All he got was "England." FYI: The British censuses are far more specific with the community and county.

Like so many North Americans, Larry turned to DNA for clues. His results showed a large match to my husband Wayne at 136 cM/9 segments. This is where I came in. Larry's last name matched the maiden name of Wayne's great-grandmother Emma (West) Shove, who died in 1890 in North Dakota.

Emma had four brothers. I only found records for one who came to Canada and settled in the same part of Ontario as Emma and her husband Fred. He hadn't married, so he was likely not Larry's ancestor. There was another brother, William, the youngest child. He has been a brick wall as there were too many William West's living in London to identify our man.

I began a tree for Larry using what he had and found the family in 1901, in Chatham, Ontario. Head of the family was "William C.", born October 18, in England, and his age suggests that he was born in 1845.

Our William was christened March 12, 1843 and although it was hard to read, the parish register suggested he was born in February. Parents were "John & Annie", so not likely the guy born in October and there was no middle name either.

So I researched Larry's ancestor's marriage and wife's family but could find no link to Wayne in that branch. On the Ontario marriage record his parents were John & Annie (how common is that?) and he had a middle initial.

Then the General Record Office in the UK offered digital copies of some birth certificates at a reduced price. Always game for a bargain, I sent for our William's and got it immediately. He wasn't born in February as I thought but the October before he was christened. On the 18 no less! Bingo! Our guys matched, except for the middle name. Did he want to impress his new in-laws, or was he honouring his brother Charles? We will never know that one.

Without DNA we may never have figured that William C. West, who died in Chatham in 1919, was our guy.

Long story short, we met Larry and his wife for lunch as they live in Alberta, and we had an interesting time. Larry and Wayne are fourth cousins. He is the first previously unknown DNA match we've ever met and guess who forgot to take any pictures? Me!

The AFHS Library is located at **712 - 16 Avenue NW, Calgary** and in-person SIG group meetings are held there.

The Library has over twelve thousand print items and many are available to be borrowed for a one-month loan. Electronic resources include computers, a multi-function printer, scanners (flatbed and overhead) and a microfiche reader. Journals from around the world are available to view in-library in either print or digital formats. As a **FamilySearch Affiliate Library**, visitors can now view additional FamilySearch digital records at the AFHS library that they can't see at home.

## Tech Tips

#### Scanning Documents With Your Smartphone

Many people, me included, use their smartphones to take pictures of all kinds of things: family and friends, cute pets, parking spot numbers, your license plate, something you want your partner to pick up at the store...the list is endless. But did you know that your smartphone can be a portable scanner?

Much better than trying to take a clear picture of a document or a batch of documents, iPhones and Android phones both have options to clearly scan a document or photo and then save it as a PDF document or JPG file. And even better? The basic options are free!

#### **iPhone**

Apple has built a simple scanner into the Notes app already installed on your phone. To see the actual help page on the Apple website, go here: <a href="https://support.apple.com/en-ca/HT210336">https://support.apple.com/en-ca/HT210336</a>

First open the Notes app and select a note or create a new one.

Then tap the Camera button  $\bigcirc$ , then tap Scan Documents  $\bigcirc$ .

Place your document in view of the camera. To manually capture a scan, tap the Shutter button or press one of the Volume buttons. If your device is in Auto mode, your document will automatically scan.

Drag the corners to adjust the scan to fit the page, then tap Keep Scan.

Tap Save. To add more pages to the scanned file, tap the  $\oplus$  button.

#### **Android**

Android phones have a few different options but one of the simplest is Microsoft Office Lens. If you are already using Microsoft apps like Word, Excel, and OneDrive, the interface will be familiar.

You can download the free app from the Google Play store or Microsoft website. The icon looks like an orange camera lens with a white L on top.

When you open the app, you are taken directly to the Viewfinder screen. The first time you use it, you may have to tap the Start Scanning button (a white camera on an orange background).

There are several options for scanning different items (Whiteboard, Document, Business Card, Photo) at the bottom of the screen but you will probably use Document the most.

Place the document you want to scan on a flat, preferably blank surface, and hold the phone above it. An orange rectangle will appear when the app has a solid lock on the edges of the document. If you have multiple pages, just click on Add New at the bottom of the app on the left side and repeat as many times as necessary.

After you have the document(s) scanned, you can save it as a JPG file to your photo gallery or as a PDF file to your phone's storage. You also have the option to send the image to OneDrive, PowerPoint or OneNote. Plus, you can import the document to Microsoft Word and use OCR to convert the document to a text file.

100 Cemeteries Strong, and Counting...






July 11, 2023 marked a major milestone for the AFHS cemetery web project Alberta Ancestors. With the addition of Albion Ridge Cemetery in Barons and Chancellor Cemetery in Chancellor, the website cemetery count has now reached triple digits.

We are proud to announce that we have now documented 100 cemeteries in the Southern Alberta region. Available on the website are well over 200,000 searchable names and almost 150,000 searchable headstone images of persons interred in the Southern Alberta region.

Alberta Ancestors is an ambitious multi-year initiative and will continue to grow in the future. In addition to robust persons and image searchability, you can also find interesting statistics and stories from the region's pioneers like Robert Dixon, better known as "Rattlesnake Pete", and Henry Alexander Cooper "The Yorkshire Giant."





AFHS volunteers have a long history of documenting cemetery burial information, going back as far as the mid to late 1970s, even before the Society's creation in 1980. Over the years, many AFHS members have stepped up to lead teams of intrepid volunteers around Southern Alberta cemeteries to photograph grave markers, record inscriptions, and help fill in blanks for genealogists searching for information on persons of interest in and around Calgary. The latest team lead is AFHS member Wendy Schultz, who took the reins over from our amazing Heather Williams in early 2021. Since that time, Wendy and her team of volunteers have managed to update over 100 cemeteries and over 200,000 persons as of Summer 2023. Quite an accomplishment!
