The New Year is now in full swing, and my list of projects has expanded with new ideas flowing in from all sides. How exciting it is to think about these new initiatives!

Some are research projects that I am dying to dive into. For example, I am pursuing the "Man on the Motorcycle" research (mentioned in my President's Message – January 2024) by hiring a genealogy consultant in Belfast to retrieve the PRONI inquest records of his death. Hopefully, these records will help me fill in the blanks of the dreadful incident and nail down the exact family relationship.

Another area I want to work on is sharing projects, where I share my journey of learning with others. I have catalogued all my various genealogy presentations and articles on my own website. Now, it is time spend a few moments to bring all this material up to date. I am also scheduled to share a couple of my presentations over the next few months.

Two other projects are connecting with younger genealogists in my family. I want to learn how my nephew successfully researched his mother's family back some 14 generations in France. And I am keen to collaborate with a young cousin on reaching out to the descendants of a group of Cree elders who were signatories to a constitution developed by my grandfather entitled *Brotherhood of the Plains*. This was a document that I inherited, along with dozens of letters he wrote from the trenches in northern France and Belgium in WWI.

Of course, AFHS remains a major focus of my energy as well. There are three main areas I am focusing on at present:

- 1. Finding more volunteers for some of our strategic activities. We had lots of great suggestions from our members on ways to increase use of the AFHS Library and increase our visibility in other ways, but we need more people to help implement them.
- Helping create a "Speakers Gallery." We have several members who have delivered some amazing presentations. The idea here is to put this information on our website so sister organizations and others can more readily access our superb talent pool, and it is another source of visibility for AFHS. How DNA Helped Solve Another Family Mystery

With unknown parents in your tree, also called non-paternity events, there are often DNA matches which seem to come out of nowhere. One of the things I've found that helps figure out these mysteries is a tip from Diahan Southard, a DNA expert that has a website and book called *Your DNA Guide*. I have also watched several of her videos and webinars on connecting DNA matches to each other. She suggests that you start with you BKM (Best Known Match).

In my example, Elizabeth is a known half-second cousin to my husband Wayne so she is the BKM. Looking at her **DNA Shared Matches** with Wayne and his sister Mo, some familiar names came up. Be aware that sometimes you have to look at the Shared Matches of the Shared Matches. Ancestry doesn't always show you low cM (centimorgan) matches. Elizabeth shares a great-grandmother, Harriet, with Wayne and Mo, but not a great-grandfather. So, I knew that I was looking exclusively at Harriet's DNA line. This is the first step.

To compound the problem, we know that Harriet's mother was Margaret, but we do not know who Harriet's father was. We now need to sort the DNA matches to either Margaret or Harriet's unknown father (let's call him 2xGU, short for great-great-grandfather unknown). Diahan suggests that at this point you need to "Do Genealogy" and develop your matches' trees. I have started a "quick and dirty" tree in my Family Tree Maker software (not on Ancestry as I do not want it to be searchable by AI yet). It's my project and I want to keep it private for now while I'm researching.

Four matches came up with a common name – good old 2xGU! He was a single man living and working in the same town by the sea as Margaret when Harriet was conceived. Coincidence? I think not. 2xGU went on to marry another girl from this town and our four matches come from that line.

Do Diahan Southard's suggestions work? Absolutely! If you want to learn more about DNA and how to find and confirm your ancestors, her work is a great place to start. Read her book, watch her webinars, and check out her DNA website and blog.

Keyboard Shortcuts for Genealogists

I watched a great webinar on *Essential Keyboard Shortcuts and Tools for Genealogy* by Peggy Jude, hosted by Legacy Family Tree Webinars. If you have a membership, I highly recommend checking it out. I chose a few of the most relevant tips and tricks to share with you here.

Many of you have heard of the basic keyboard shortcuts for copy, cut and paste:

CTRL + C	copy text
CTRL + X	cut out the text
CTRL + V	paste text

Two other shortcuts that I use often are:

CTRL + Z	undo the last change you made
CTRL + Y	redo the change you just undid

If you have mastered those shortcuts, you may want to learn some of these shortcuts for working with File Explorer on a Windows computer (where you save your folders of documents). You will find the **Windows key** and **ALT key** on most Windows computer keyboards.

WINDOWS KEY + E	open File Explorer
CTRL + SHIFT + N	create a new folder
ALT + Up Arrow key	go up one level in File Explorer
F2	rename the selected folder or file
CTRL + F	open the search box in File Explorer

BOOK REVIEW

Build Your Family Tree: A Guide For Canadians With Local And Global Roots by Lynne Butler.

The title of this book is a bit deceiving, as it is mainly a primer for learning how to research historic wills and documents through the probate process from a genealogist's perspective. Wills and notarial records can be a treasure trove of information for the family researcher as they often state relationships between persons as well as giving insight into family dynamics and sometimes the "location of that daughter that moved away and got married in a distant land."

The first 69 pages concisely explain the background of wills and probate in Canada. Lynne Butler, a lawyer by trade, provides an easy-to-read explanation of wills, their content, the court system and its records, along with many useful hints.

The balance of the book is a list of annotated resources for researching wills and probate in Canada. There are listings and discussions of the numerous sources of information for each province and territory too. There are comments on what to expect at each source, particularly with respect to probate records.

Lynn Butler's book is an excellent resource for family history researchers wanting to learn about wills in Canada.
