Family Lore: Fact or Fiction?

One year, I got a *Family Tree Kit* for Christmas. I enjoyed the stories my parents shared about their childhoods and families so was interested to learn more. My maternal lines were already well researched by my maternal grandmother. It helped the family lived in the same place for 300 years or so! My dad's family did not talk about the past much.

I asked my Nana, my paternal grandmother Catherine (Hall) Godfrey, to help me and she filled out some family group sheets with the information she remembered about her parents and grandparents. Nana was only 5 years old when her father passed away from pneumonia in England. Shortly afterward, she and her mother went back to Canada (Nana had been born in Canada although her parents were English and Manx) and her mother remarried. Nana grew up with a stepfather and stepsiblings, whom she loved dearly. They were a happy family and, while she did remember her father a little, she didn't have a lot of information on him and his family. One of the things she mentioned intrigued me, as she thought either her father (Charles Geoffrey Hall) or her grandfather (James Hall) was born in Malta. I decided to see if it was true and how an Englishman had ended up in Malta, of all places. I found James Hall on several English Census returns, always shown as being born in England. His children were all listed as being born in England too. So maybe Nana was mistaken?

As I continued my research of Nana's family, I decided to look up James Hall's wife (**Catherine Heaton**, daughter of **Thomas Heaton**). James and Catherine married in Blackburn, Lancashire, England, in 1851. I found them on the 1851 census, living with her family. When I first looked at the census, the two of them were on a separate page from the rest of the household. Later, I realized the rest of her family were on the previous census page AND that the birthplaces of two of her younger siblings was listed as **Malta**! So, Nana had the story right but for the other side of her family.

I connected with a cousin in England who had researched the Heaton family. He had found Thomas in the 1851 census listed as a pensioner at the fairly young age of 42. His investigations revealed Thomas had been a career soldier in the Royal Artillery. He served for over 21 years and spent a year in Portugal and 9 years in Malta. Since at least two of his children were born there, the family obviously joined him for some of the time. I recently found baptism records for three of the Heaton siblings in Maltese records on FindMyPast, with their birthdates listed. The records lead me to believe they were born there. All the other children in the family have English birth or baptism records.

Nana never met either of her father's parents. James Hall died in 1882. Catherine (Heaton) Hall died in 1909. Nana was born in November 1908, but her parents were living in Victoria, British Columbia, at the time and only went back to England when her father heard his mother was ill. Unfortunately, she died before her son and his family made it back to England. They stayed in England for several years, so Nana must have met some of her Hall and Heaton relations and heard family stories about life in Malta.

It is good to remember there is often at least a kernel of truth in family stories! But always remember to verify the information with actual records when possible as things can get mixed up over the years and retellings.

The AFHS Library is located at **712 - 16 Avenue NW, Calgary** and all in-person SIG group meetings are held there. Members are encouraged to stay after meetings, when possible, to browse the collection!

The Library has over twelve thousand print items and many are available to be borrowed for a onemonth loan. Electronic resources include computers, a multi-function printer, scanners (flatbed and overhead) and a microfiche reader. Journals from around the world are available to view in-library in either print or digital formats. As a **FamilySearch Affiliate Library**, visitors can now view additional FamilySearch digital records at the AFHS library that they can't see at home.



Alberta Family Histories Society Resource Centre

Our resource centre, located at **712** - **16 Avenue NW** in Calgary, has many tools and resources available for members and visitors. We are usually open two days a week: Thursday from 10 am to 2 pm and Saturday from noon to 4:00 pm. Please check the AFHS website calendar for our open times. There is free parking available behind the building.

SCANNING STATION

Recent upgrades have included creation of a Scanning Station. This station has a dedicated computer with scanning devices including an overhead scanner for fragile documents, a flatbed scanner (that scans slides and negatives too), a new multi-function printer/scanner/copier that can scan documents up to 11"x17" (ledger sized) and a sheet feeder for scanning double-sided documents quickly and efficiently. Your scans can be saved for free to a USB key (thumb drive) or you can print paper copies for a small donation.





The AFHS library contains over 12,000 print resources with a focus on Alberta and Canada, but you will find many hidden treasures on a variety of topics. Volunteers are available to help and many items are able to be borrowed by members for a month. New and donated items are constantly being added. The collection includes many local history books, general reference books on genealogy, maps, atlases and gazetteers and journals and newsletters from around the world. If you see an "Access restricted" icon when you find a record on FamilySearch (it looks like a key over a camera), you can visit the AFHS library and sign in to FamilySearch to view most of those records. Use our computers or your own laptop signed into the AFHS Wifi network.
