The AFHS Resource Centre is on the move! We were planning to stay in our current location, but after finding out that our current landlord wanted to increase our rent and have us pay for part of the new furnace the building needed, we reconsidered our options. We were offered a great opportunity at a new location, and the Board met to discuss it.

The leadership team discussed the pros and cons of both spaces. The new location has more useable space, a convenient location, more things included in the cost of the lease (rent, utilities, snow removal, cleaning and security are all included in one payment). Our insurance will also be cheaper. It is big enough to hold our regular in-person Society meetings there, as well as SIG meetings, workshops and social events. A comparison of costs showed we will save money with the move. We decided to go forward with a five-year lease on the new location, with the option to renew for a further five years.

A few of the features of our new location are:

- Large enough space to house our Resource Centre, including all our bookshelves and computer equipment, with plenty left over for meetings and other events
- A kitchenette that will allow us to easily provide hot drinks at our meetings and socials
- Accessible to people with mobility issues (elevator to the suite, handicapped parking stalls near the door, accessible stalls in the shared washroom on the same floor)
- Attached parkade with ample public parking spaces
- Close to Heritage C-Train station and the #81 bus stops right outside

The leadership team feels that by consolidating our Resource Centre and meeting space, we will be able to simplify day-to-day operations, increase use of our space, make things easier for our volunteers, and strengthen our sense of community. I'm sure Warren and Marion will be relieved that they no longer need to transport our presentation technology to various locations!

The move will be coordinated by a team of volunteers, with a moving company to do the heavy lifting. The plan is to move around the end of April and reopen in May. I am excited to find out what we can accomplish now, in this new space!

Ancestor Anecdotes

It Just Fell into My Hands! Ann Williams



When I was a pre-teen, this framed studio portrait of my brothers was on display on top of our piano. At some point, it was replaced by other photographs. I thought nothing of it until six decades later when the photo literally fell into my hands.

I didn't recognise the boys at first, but there was something very familiar about the windmill held by one of them. Eventually, I recognized my brothers and remembered where I had last seen the photograph.

I rediscovered the photo when I was taking a picture of my grandfather and his horse and cart out of its silver frame for scanning. Grandfather's photograph was from the beginning of our family transport business. But there, behind my grandfather, was this second photograph. Saying I was delighted to see it again was an understatement!

It Fell Out of a Book Amber Godfrey



This beautiful silk postcard fell out of a book when my cousin was going through her late mother's possessions. Her mother was my aunt, and the writing on the back, in pen, was our grandmother's (known as Nana by us). Nana's mother, Emma Costain, and father, Charles G. Hall, travelled to Canada on the *Empress of Britain* in 1907. On the back of the postcard, in faint pencil, is the inscription, "Emmie, from Charley."

The family story is that the couple were engaged for ten years and Emma got tired of waiting. She hated English society rules (she was from the Isle of Man), so she arranged for a job in Victoria, British Columbia, and bought her ticket. Charles decided to go with her. They married in Victoria in January 1908, and my Nana was born that November. In early 1909, Charles's mother became ill and they went back to England. Sadly, Charles died in 1913 from pneumonia. Emma and Nana then returned to Canada. **SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS (SIGs) are the ideal place to expand your knowledge and share your own family history challenges.** The small-group setting gives you an opportunity to ask questions and get help from more experienced researchers.

SIGs are now being held in three formats: in-person only, Zoom only or a hybrid version of in-person & Zoom. Check the calendar on our website for up-to-date information or email the SIG leader. The SIG groups do not meet during July and August.

The AFHS Resource Centre is located at **712-16 Avenue NW**, **Calgary** and all in-person SIG group meetings are held there. Members are encouraged to stay after meetings, when possible, to browse the collection!

Our collection has over twelve thousand print items and many are available to be borrowed for a onemonth loan. Electronic resources include computers, a multi-function printer, scanners (flatbed and overhead) and a microfiche reader. Journals from around the world are available to view in either print or digital formats. As a **FamilySearch Affiliate Library**, visitors can now view additional FamilySearch digital records at the AFHS Resource Centre that they can't see at home. We also have a subscription to the Canadian newspapers on Newspaper Archive.

Alberta Research Portal – Newspapers

The Alberta Research Portal is a collection of historical documents that includes books, manuscripts, photographs, newspapers, maps, magazines and more. All the information it contains is available free to anyone in Alberta, thanks to donations by several universities, colleges and public libraries throughout the province.

One of the collections is Newspapers, which includes archives of iconic British and American publications. These are searchable, and they cover a variety of time periods from the mid-1800s to present day. Some examples of the newspapers available include:

British

- 17th and 18th Century Burney Newspapers Collection
- 19th Century UK Periodicals
- British Library Newspapers
- Daily Mail Historical Archive
- Picture Post Historical Archive, 1938-1957
- Punch Historical Archive, 1841-1992
- The Illustrated London News Historical Archive, 1842-2003
- The Telegraph Historical Archive
- The Sunday Times and The Times Historical Archive

American

- 19th Century U.S. Newspapers
- Liberty Magazine Historical Archive, 1924-1950
- Smithsonian Collections Online

Each collection uses the Gale Search interface. There is a basic **Search Box** at the top of the page. Underneath is an **Advanced Search** option, where you can use operators and special characters (AND, OR, NOT, quotation marks, wildcards, etc.) to limit your search terms. You can also click on the **Publication Search** option and then click on "List All Publications" to see a list of all the newspapers included. Each publication has a clickable link that gives you information on the dates and areas covered in the collection and allows you to search within the publication. Finally, you can use the **Topic Finder** option which uses a search term entered by you to compile titles, subjects and the first 100 words from your top results to create a graphic with the terms found most often in the search results. You can then click on the words in the graphic to view relevant articles from the newspapers.

If you haven't seen this free resource, you should take a look. Even if it doesn't contain a specific article on your ancestors, it is a valuable source of information that can give you valuable background information on the time and place your ancestor lived.

Land Acknowledgement

In the spirit of reconciliation, we would like to acknowledge that the land on which we gather and where we work to preserve the records and family history of those who came before us are on the traditional territories of the Blackfoot Confederacy (comprising of the Siksika, Kainai, and Piikani First Nations), the Tsúūt'ínà, the Stoney Nakoda (including the Chiniki, Bearspaw and Goodstoney First Nations), the Métis Nation (Districts 5 & 6) and all people who make their homes in the Treaty 7 region of Southern Alberta.
