

Ukraine Genealogy Group (UGG) of Edmonton and Area Society, Alberta August 2026 Update



UGG Edmonton and Area Society continues to provide information and suggestions to its members whose interests include the geographic areas of East Galicia (Ukraine), West Galicia (Poland), Bukovina (Ukraine and Romania), Volhynia, and the West Russian Empire (Ukraine and Poland), and all of Ukraine. We have decided to expand this group to include Polish settlers to Alberta due to no one else locally covering this region involving genealogy. We invite people from all of the Eastern European countries to participate in our meetings.

There are no membership requirements to this genealogy group. Our main focus at this time is on Western Canada and the former regions of Galicia and Bukovina in Western Ukraine and Poland. Whenever possible the presentation or the handouts are shared with the participants who attend the Zoom meetings and in-person workshops. The Zoom sessions are recorded with permission from the guest speaker, in advance. At some point, we will be putting the recorded sessions on a new UGG Edmonton website or YouTube channel.

Here is the current 2026 schedule for the “Ukraine Genealogy Group of Edmonton and Area”:

The UGG Edmonton Board has decided to organize a series of Zoom and in-person sessions beginning this fall. We are currently in discussions with several local, Canadian, and U.S. guest speakers and will share further details as plans are confirmed. We are also exploring opportunities with a couple of venues to host monthly or bi-monthly Research Club meetings. As UGG Edmonton does not charge membership fees, we are primarily seeking low-cost or complimentary venues and activities whenever possible.



We have created a “Ukraine Genealogy Group – Edmonton and Area Society”, a private Facebook group. This is a Ukraine genealogy group which is based in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada but collaborates with family researchers from Western Canada. The recurring discussion about “**Eastern European**” versus “**Ukraine/Ukrainian**” genealogy has surfaced once again. This is not a new issue; it has been debated for at least the 30 years that I have been involved in family history research and genealogy. My understanding is that Natalie Edwards addressed this matter years ago. When she stepped down as leader of the Ukraine SIG, she shared with me some of the background and considerations surrounding the issue. A great deal

of thought, discussion, and deliberation went into the decision to continue focusing on Ukrainian genealogy rather than expanding the group's mandate to encompass all of Eastern Europe, before we registered as a society with a board.

Every organization must make decisions based on its available resources, volunteers, expertise, and time. Rather than duplicating efforts already being undertaken elsewhere, I believe it is important for organizations to focus on where they can provide the greatest value. We all work within our respective capacities and strive to make the best use of the resources available to us.

Jewish Biopolitics: The Birth of Civil Records in Eastern Europe with Tomasz Jankowski, Nov. 15, 2-4 pm, Zoom session, Jewish Genealogical Society of New York. The introduction of vital registration (the recording of births, deaths, and marriages) for Jews in the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth was an essential state-building measure associated with Enlightenment reforms. Registration of these vital events was one of the first steps in transforming Jews from state subjects into citizens, providing them with an official identity and, thus, better legal protection. Following the partitions of Poland-Lithuania, the annexing states—Austria, Prussia, and Russia—applied various solutions, ranging from relatively quick emancipation in Prussia to the maintenance of inefficient regulations in Galicia and the Russian Empire, which forced Jews to defend their right to informational self-determination and underreport vital events—the latter much to the dismay of contemporary genealogists and family historians. This lecture provides a deeper understanding of the context in which primary genealogical sources were formed in Eastern Europe, and how basic limits to Jewish genealogical research were established. Western Volhynia (Ukraine) Ancestors? Check This Out? By Lara Diamond, posted on July 12. The United States Holocaust Museum Memorial (USHMM) has a great new research resource for those with ancestors from the part of Volynia that was intra-war Poland, particularly the area around Lutsk, Volhynia, Ukraine (then Łuck, Wołyń, Poland). There are records for both Jews and non-Jews, and many of the records are pre-WWII. Our History:

Ukrainians were originally known as the Rus' (or Ruthenians) because we belonged to the medieval state of Kyivan Rus' (9th–13th centuries).

After the Mongol invasion of 1240, Kyivan Rus' fragmented into several successor states. Over the following centuries, the ancestors of modern Ukrainians continued to identify as Rusyny (Ruthenians), particularly in Galicia, Volhynia, and Transcarpathia.

By the 17th century, the name Ukraine became increasingly associated with the Cossack lands along the Dnipro River. During the 19th-century Ukrainian national revival, writers and intellectuals such as Taras Shevchenko, Panteleimon Kulish, and Mykhailo Drahomanov helped transform "Ukrainian" from a regional designation into a modern national identity, distinguishing it from both Polish and Russian identities.

In simple terms, the evolution looked like this: Rus' → Ruthenians (Rusyny) → Ukrainians. It was not a change of people, but a gradual evolution of identity shaped by changing political realities, language, culture, and the rise of modern nationalism over roughly 600 years.

While Ukrainian became the national identity of the modern state, the historic name Rusyn is still used by some communities, particularly in the Carpathian region.

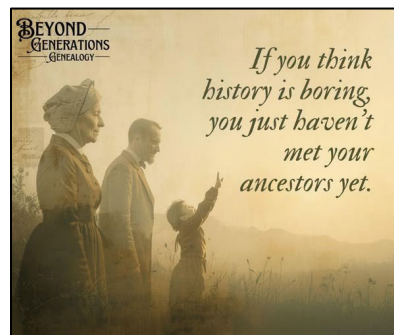
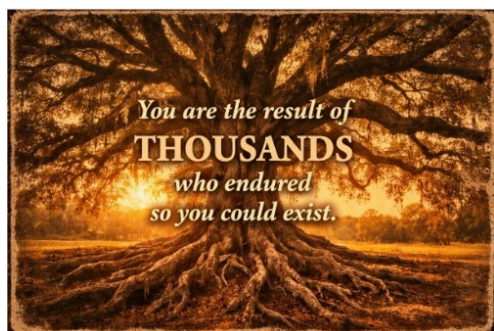

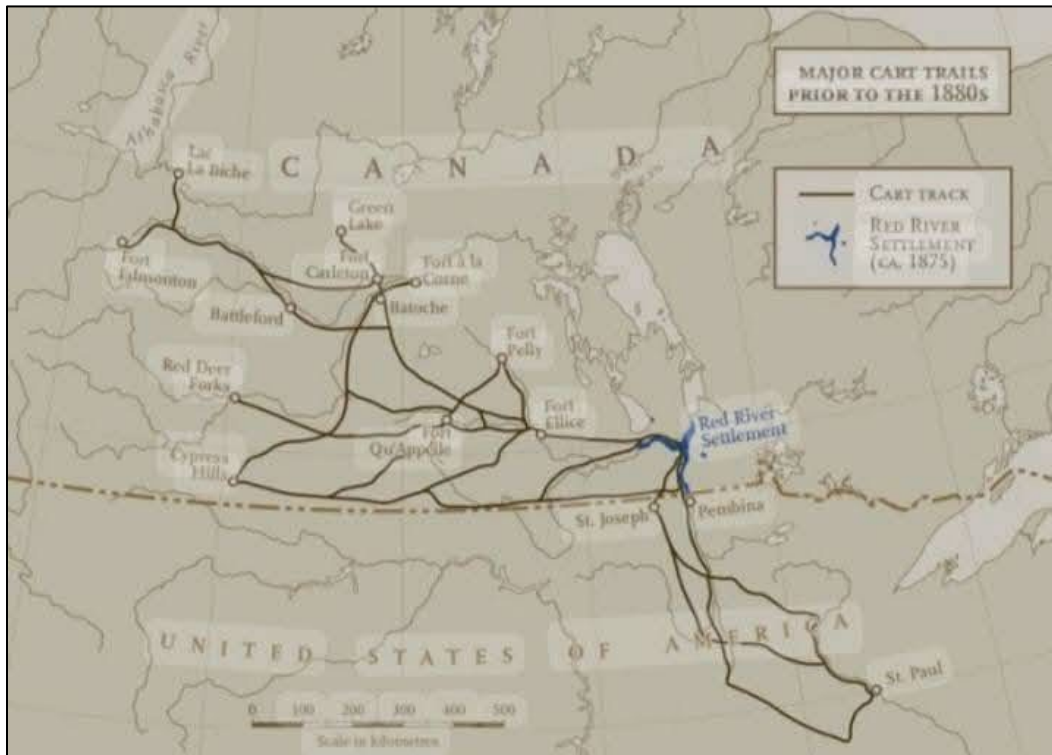
